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<b>Simulation Grant</b>	<p>\$100,000 grant for simulation (Center for Rural Health):</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Ambulance shell with equipment (set-up like simulation room)</li> <li>• Travel to rural sites</li> </ul>	<p>Jill mentioned that ambulance in Washburn is for sale.</p>
<b>New Allied Health Location</b>	<p>Unisys building near BSC campus will be new site next year. Hoping to move next fall, 2019. New space will be double in size from what we have currently.</p>	<p>Fundraising/donation campaigns continue. Need to raise 8M dollars.</p>
<b>Nursing Shortage Task Force</b>	<p>Doug Burgum (leader). Annie is on CUNEA which is a key player. Looking at Universal Application Process which may/may not help. Trying to be innovative with plans/ideas. Job retention continues to be a struggle (secondary to weekends, night shifts, compensation).</p> <p>Nursing faculty in ND make 13 percent less than other areas in the nation. Hoping that legislation will help this matter. Lots of retiring faculty as well.</p>	<p>Self-scheduling and 8-hour shifts may be helpful. Greta suggested doing more “grooming” of students to better handle professional expectations/lifestyle changes.</p>
<b>Committee Input: New trends</b>	<p>HARVEY: new clinic in town, getting more providers.</p> <p>HAZEN: going live with new EMR (EPIC) on April Fool’s Day, 2019. Long term care facility getting new EMR as well. Mass Casualty Drill coming in the near future; will include nursing students.</p> <p>ASHLEY: feel that recruiting and community awareness may need to be increased for next year. Jackie asked about clearance for students to take part in patient experiences. Annie affirmed that the facilities are contracted clinical sites and it shouldn’t typically be an issue. The patient can however, always decline students.</p> <p>HANNA PIKE (CHI): Dilaudid now requires a filter needle due to manufacturer warnings about filaments in the carpupject. No more insulin pens unless patient-supplied.</p> <p>STACEY SJOBERG (TELEMETRY): Bedside nursing is supposed to be house-wide, but not seeing it happen consistently. Professional rounds would also ideal. PureWick female external catheter being used on some floors with good results; both CHI and Sanford.</p>	<p>Discussed possibility of starting a SNO group to increase exposure. Annie will work with Jackie as needed.</p> <p>Annie will look at bringing new product into the student lab setting.</p>

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	<p>JESSIE (TURTLE LAKE): students involved with flu shot clinics. EPIC upgrade coming mid-November. Investigating urgent-care clinic in town. Nursing Home Survey (State) upcoming.</p> <p>JILL WIESE (SDS): new bladder scanner is impressive. Seeing a lot of retirement and reducing hours in nursing staff.</p> <p>GRETA (SANFORD): no longer use air bolus for blind NG placement confirmation. Would like to see students learning education and care planning better and sooner.</p> <p>QUINN KARGES (CHI): not sure how/if education and care plans are being used effectively in EPIC.</p> <p>Quinn and Hanna agree that having more than one patient assignment towards the end of their last year was helpful. Suggested doing more with SBAR/shift reporting and provider interactions.</p>	<p>Keep a look out for old/outdate equipment that the school could have for student teaching.</p> <p>Encourage students to speak-up if they see a practice that is not evidence-based. On clinicals, faculty should show the students how to update care plans and education plans (individualized).</p> <p>Consider implementing Rapid Response education into curriculum. Reinforce reporting and SBAR usage during clinicals/simulation.</p>
